Dear Flyway Festival Friends and Fans,

Migrate, ebb and flow. Wild within and without us.

This evening, the Napa River rushes to the shore, overflowing its banks before me in a combination of high tide and swollen flooding with the distinctive lapping from the Ferry's deep and powerful wake.

Nitro sits silently close to me on a small rise above the roadway to the Mare Island Shoreline Heritage Preserve where we spend a portion of every afternoon and evening. Where we have sat side-by-side every day since the day we were kept from entering the gate to the parkland my fellow volunteer pioneers and I opened to the public for the first time in 150 years, in February 2007 during the San Francisco Bay Flyway Festival.

Imagine the exhilaration, then! About this same time of evening, as the winter sun was setting on the other side of the bluff, we gathered for guided outings and a peek at our soon to be visitor center – a cavernous mass of Bethlehem steel girders formed the ceiling above, surrounded on 4 sides by 8-inch thick steel reinforced poured concrete walls attached to deep concrete flooring, 6-10 ft thick, perched on the former marshes of the same River I view, tonight. So little has changed in the now, not 150 years, but 165 years since the Naval Ammunition Depot was

established here on the original hill and marshes of the south end of the Shipyard. I sit amongst the great blue gum eucalyptus trees that were planted along the route to the visitor center, a half a mile away from the gate, as the winter clouds in the distant sky take on a slight hue of pink.

Pacific tree or chorus frogs, croak. A hummingbird trill alerts all in the area, that its' nest and territory are near. The deep repetitive voice of a great-horned owl emanates from the mixed forest of coast oak, acacia and eucalyptus on the bluff behind me.

Toyon berries hang dense, deep red and ripened on their host native shrubs. New growth glows almost



fluorescently on the young oaks while the winter glimmer of golden yellow has muted some on the willow across the way. The willow to the north, was adorned with bright yellow into December and then, in a mysterious moment, it appears almost ephemeral with not a leaf. How does Fall just one day become winter?

A eucalyptus "button" falls near us. Another solo frog calls from its world of wetness. The owl hoots, once more. A duck's voice wafts from the river. There is this silence here that so many visitors and users remark on. The quiet. The peace. The magic.

Yet, you likely see it as "not perfect". Elderly ammunition storage buildings, magazines and bunkers. An electrical substation with massive power towers shuttling electricity to the Island. Still, I see beyond all this industrial edginess to the iconic mountains across the town, beyond the river.

Where you see mud puddles and potholes, I see reflections of the sky and clouds and willows. Where you see chainlink fences and gates with warning signs, I see past them to hillsides where ancient old growth grasses flourish and a bunker fills with an evening glow of the last light before the night falls. This is the magic of magic. There is a verse in the Bible I am recalling: "Be still, and know that I am god."

As a bicyclist rides swiftly past, even he does not break the silence of this special place of peace. All is sacred here. Even the old concrete buildings at the river's shore have been imbued with cathedral-like qualities.



My reverence for these sacred lands; these woodlands from before time; these mysterious lands where indigenous peoples came to say their prayers, gather, hunt, plant, tend, bury and honor their ancient ones; these lands are held in trust now, by you and me. For us to honor and hold. For us to share together as sacred space. For us to be inspired by. For us to be restored in the presence of.

Wilderness—wild near us...so close.

This wilderness, as I say, “wild near us”, isn’t for others to profit from. These lands have survived and now been set aside for eternity to serve their natural purpose. Their time of toil is over. Their time of war is bygone. They are now for all that is wild. All that might find a place to raise their young, to feed and forage. These lands are a place of undisturbed respite for those migrating on their great journey, as those before them, since the beginning of time.

May we gather together to celebrate this season of migration, of rest, of nourishment, for all who travel the great Flyway. May we devote ourselves more than ever before, to keeping our open spaces open, our serene places, untouched, our magnificent and majestic vistas clear, our places of peace, preserved.

May all who share this purpose, all who care deeply about these ways, all who have not yet discovered our wildnesses and wildernesses where waters, earth and sky coalesce, come together, gather together at this annual celebration with a specific purpose. To certainly find ourselves awed and inspired. And, more.

Let’s renew our vows together during this time of seasonal wonder. That we, you and I and each of us who cherish this land held in trust, will commit to helping ensure that our wildlands here on Mare Island and throughout the San Francisco Bay, will be forever open and free. Free on which

to roam, to rest, to reflect and to renew.

Night is surrounding Nitro and me, now. The land and its waters, shores, clouds and stars above, envelope us as one, as we snuggle under our winter covers of warmth and wild loveliness. Sleep well, my precious ones. Dream of safe places and spaces for all.

This year, February 11, 12 and 13, 2022 we will once again celebrate the migration of as many as 1 million shorebirds, a quarter million waterfowl, ducks and geese, and likely tens of thousands of raptors, hawks and millions of songbirds, to and through San Francisco Bay. We are privileged to live nearby to these gatherings on the waters and in the sky at our national wildlife refuges and state wildlife areas.

Frustrating as it is to once again, be pretty restricted in terms of public gatherings, I’m certain you will agree that getting outdoors for guided hikes will be really wonderful, as will the choice to just snuggling under your favorite blanket on the couch and soak up history and nature of the Bay’s “north shore”!

When you join Robin Leong for a birding outing on Mare Island, you get to spend time with not only an expert and enthusiastic birdwatcher, but, you will learn about Mare Island history from a 30-plus year civilian employee of the Mare Island Naval Shipyard. The walk is about one-mile, but does rise somewhat steeply near the top of the hill. You will likely see great blue herons, possibly great egrets and osprey, certainly red-tailed hawks, possibly a red-shouldered hawk and white tailed kites, and certainly, songbirds. Bring what you need for a hike and if you have binoculars or cameras, that would be great! Meet at the visitor center parking lot. See directions above Friday, 8:00am.

Mare Island is home to the last of its kind of the 130 boats built for this purpose during WWII. The Historic WWII Mighty Midget Landing Craft Support (LCS-102) Gunboat is located at Berth 6, the historic WWII submarine repair berth. Flags will be flying on the boat.

There's a chance of seeing a kingfisher perched on the mooring lines, osprey, great blue herons and a "pet" gull that follows the crew around. All volunteer. Tours are free. Donations appreciated.


