Note #2 - What about the birds?

1. I want to thank all of the people who have volunteered to monitor our Bluebird Nesting Boxes this year. We are currently monitoring 73 boxes at 5 separate locations with 130 Western Bluebird eggs or chicks having been counted so far. In addition to the Bluebirds, we also have 12 Tree Swallow nests with a majority of these nests having eggs in them. So far, it's turning out to be a good season for our nesting birds.

4. Patricia Innes sent me this image of "Mama Hummingbird" feeding her young in a nest the bird built on her porch. Pat has been able to monitor this nest from its being built and hopefully will see the baby birds fledge.



5. In March, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service announced the latest population estimate for Bald Eagles, and the news was heartening. Some 316,000 eagles now cruise the skies in the Lower 48—more than four times the previous estimate, from 2009. And the number of nesting pairs has more than doubled since 2009.
